DIOCESAN CHILDREN WELCOME THE NEW BISHOP

Bishop Stephen Conway was Instituted as Bishop of Ely in the Cathedral on Saturday March 5th. Before the formal service began the Bishop met children from the diocese at a Celebration Service in the neighbouring St Mary's Church. Among the young people was 9 year old Kate Goy, an acolyte and server at Emmanuel Church, Parson Drove. This is Kate's report for "*Village Voices*".



A few of us kids from Gorefield, Wisbech St Mary and Parson Drove were very fortunate to attend Bishop Stephen's Celebration Service at St Mary's Church in Ely. I have been on many trips in my life before – Wickstead Park, Woburn Safari Park and a whole lot more, but nothing was as exciting, wonderful and amazing as the preparation for the enthroning of Bishop Stephen.

As we entered the church we were handed a plastic windmill and a glow stick – we hadn't got a clue what these were for! When we entered the church wonderful singing and music filled our ears. The service started with Bishop Stephen walking down the middle of the little church wearing a bright purple robe - he is so tall!!

Bishop Stephen sat at the front of the church on a throne like chair. After a couple of hymns Bishop Stephen was presented with the Crozier by 3 boys – the Crozier was beautiful - I think it was made of pure gold and shimmered in the light. Then came the presentation of the Pectoral Cross – a young girl helped Bishop Stephen place the large golden cross, which was attached to a golden chain, around his neck. The girl said a prayer, we all sang some lovely hymns.

Bishop Stephen put on his golden robes and a child then presented him with the Mitre which made him even taller! As we prayed for Bishop Stephen and said Amen we blew on our windmills and this was a reminder of the breath of God. The glow sticks represented the light of the world and the children placed a glow stick as a bracelet on an adult's wrist. Then the adults placed a glow stick as a bracelet on a child's wrist.

When the service ended we walked out of the warm church and were given a pot of bubbles to blow. Then we escorted Bishop Stephen to Ely Cathedral across the green to the beat of a drum.

We stopped just in front of the cathedral and realised that there were two white cages stuffed with gleaming white doves. There was a drum role and two boys lifted the lids off the cages and the doves flew off high into the sky – a few needed some pushing and shoving though!

Bishop Stephen then entered the cathedral hand in hand with two children to begin the enthroning ceremony.

We went back to St Mary's Church for cups of squash and a munch on some delicious Bishop's Biscuits.

I had a great day and it was an experience I will never forget.

Vicar's Verbals

The aftermath of a disaster brings with it considerable aftershocks of all kinds. Hopefully, by the time you read this, the terrible events in Japan will have started to recede and that most resourceful and dignified of peoples will have started to rebuild its stricken country. One reason, I learn, why the British and Japanese people get on quite well is their peculiar, indirect and understated way of addressing issues, sometimes misinterpreted as coolness or indifference. We avoid overt shows of emotion and prefer not to compliment or criticise directly, instead inviting those we meet to enter into a curious verbal dance, an oblique exchange of mild rewards or concerns. But this quant costume cloaks a vigorous and gritty frame, a 'no fuss and get on with it' mentality which both nations have as their default setting. The Japanese have their own particular brand of Buddhism which combines intense spiritual focus and disciplined tranquillity with a deep reverence for the heritage of their ancestors. In this country many people are losing touch with their equally unique religious traditions, which is a shame because I believe many of our strengths come from a hidden spirituality. After all, there were Christians in East Anglia while the Romans were still our masters. Easter, with its theme of death and resurrection, of new life out of decay, of hope after disaster, is a good time for reclaiming those traditions. **Matthew.**

The Highways Reporting Project allows people to

- Report a fault using a web-based mapping system to ensure the exact location is identified and notified to repair teams
- Check on-line to see if the fault has already been reported
- Let the customer go on-line to check progress on repair work
- Does away with the need for the public to use other reporting systems
- People will still be able to report faults by telephone on 0345 045 5212.

DISABLED CHILDREN'S ACCESS TO CHILDCARE (DCATCH)

The Cambridgeshire County Council Disabled Children's Access to Childcare (DCATCH) project is aimed at supporting parents/carers of disabled children in accessing suitable childcare; enabling them the chance of returning to employment and/or training. It is part of the Cambridgeshire Childcare Information Service (CIS).

The aim of DCATCH is to highlight that "*a child with a disability and his/her family should have access to the full range of childcare options that are open to other families*" *Sure Start, 2005*

The aim of the project is to work closely with parents, childcare providers and professionals, embedding the principles of DCATCH; ensuring inclusion into early years and childcare settings for all. A referral service to parents shows where to go for support and guidance with their childcare options via the Childcare Brokerage Service.

Once a family is identified we can then, through the CIS Childcare Brokerage Service, enquire about suitable childcare. This will include information on provision of childcare from providers, funding options, costs, specialist care and specialist facilities, if required by the provider.

The DCATCH project provides a service to families, which is free of charge and completely impartial. Gorefield Parish Council is pleased to be associated with **Village Voices**.

Gorefield now has a unique status in Fenland as the only village to boast adult exercise equipment, comparable to that found in your local gym or health club, available free to use in the **Adventure Patch**. This is the final phase of a project to improve the facilities available in Gorefield that has been led by Councillor Norman Carroll who has attracted well in excess of £67,000 of external funding for the project. Work to bond markings to the concrete area for a remote car track and other games, which was started but abandoned due to the weather, will be completed soon. The Council also has three new bench seats and two new refuse bins waiting to be fitted to complete the Patch ready for everyone's enjoyment.

COUNCIL TAX PRECEPT

You will by now have received your 2011/2012 Council Tax demand from Fenland District Council and may well be wondering why the Gorefield Parish Council precept has gone up by 10.3% while others have kept to a nil increase. Before explaining the reason let me put it into context. The 10.3% increase amounts to £1.77 per year on a Band D equivalent, that is just under an extra 3.5 pence per week. When setting the budget for the coming year an additional £1200 was identified as extra expenditure but £500 of this was offset from reserves. The resulting increase of £700 on the 2010/2011 precept of £6800 equates to 10.3%. This means a Band D equivalent charge in Gorefield of £18.94 for the year which compares well to the highest precepting Parish in Fenland (Wisbech St Mary) which charges £36.72 and the lowest (Leverington) at £16.65. Both these Parishes have a vastly different tax base and geographical area to Gorefield. Our closest comparative Council, one of similar size and tax base, is Newton who has set a precept for 2011/2012 of £18.83 while the average Parish precept in the District works out to be just under £24.00. So back to 'why the increase', well it is mainly due to the success of the Adventure Patch because even though funding was from external sources it does mean regular safety checks, additional maintenance, extra manual grass cutting etc. There is also the not insignificant matter of insurance for the field, the pavilion and the play equipment, sadly success has a price but not bad for an additional £1.77 a year.

This is your opportunity to attend and speak to the Parish Council. It is your chance to share your ideas, comments and feed back with the Council who will then take those views forward on your behalf. This will be followed immediately by the April Council meeting, the last one of the present 4 year term. EVERYONE IS WELCOME TO ATTEND
