Voices Past

ORGAN OPENING CEREMONY AT GUYHIRN

from the "Wisbech Advertiser" April 25 1888

The organ recently erected at Guyhirn church by Messrs Claypole & Sons, of Peterborough, was opened for Divine Service on Wednesday last. Both the instrument, at which Miss Roper ably presided, and the arrangements for the opening ceremony proved satisfactory.

The composition of the organ is as follows:

Great organ: 1,open diapason; 2,stopped diapason; 3,principal; 4,fifteenth; 5,mixtures.

Swell organ: 6,keurdophon; 7,gedast; 8,gemshorn; 9,flute.

Pedal organ: 10,bourdon.

Couplers: 11,swell to great organ; 12,pedal couplers.

The opening service was preceded by a sale of work in the school, the proceeds of which amounted to about £10 8s. Much work which had been so kindly given remained unsold, to dispose of which a clearance sale will be held in the autumn. Great praise is due to the many willing helpers, in contributing to the success of this sale of work. The tea also proved satisfactory, about 150 partaking of it, and to whom the kind tea-makers gave good attention.

At the evening service the church was crowded, and the following clergy were present:

Rev F Carlyon, rector of Leverington;

Rev G Woodgate, rector of Tydd St Giles;

Rev H M Winbolt, vicar of Sutton St Edmunds;

Rev R D Jones, vicar of Wisbech St Mary;

and Rev J B Higham, curate of Thorney.

The prayers were read by the vicar, Rev William Carpenter; the lessons by the Revs R D Jones and G Woodgate; and an excellent and appropriate sermon was preached by the Rev F H Cox, Rural Dean and vicar of Elm, the text being taken from the 150th Psalm. The reverend gentleman remarked that praise, as the expression of gratitude, joy, and Christian faith, formed a very important part of our worship. Praise and singing. sustained by the aid of musical instruments, formed an important part of the worship in the ancient Church as described in the Old Testament Scriptures. The voice of praise was constantly heard from our Blessed Lord and his followers, as we read in the New Testament. When our Lord was about to prepare His disciples for that dark hour of His sufferings, they joined together in singing a hymn. The early Christians were celebrated for their heartiness in singing hymns to Christ as God, and the book of the Revelation shows what the triumphant song of praise of the redeemed will be bye and bye, with "harpers harping with their harps".

He trusted the new organ, now dedicated to God, might be a real help in sustaining the praises of the congregation, and he would conclude with the words of the great musician Haydn, who on being applauded at the rendering of the words "Let there be light" in the great oratorio "The Creation", replied, "Not so, give God the glory". Let this be our aim, "Give God the Glory".

The collections at this service, the organ recital, and on the previous Sunday realized £7 7s 1d.

A VERY IMPORTANT MESSAGE

Hello, my name is Margaret and I am your local **Swarm Co-ordinator.** If you find a swarm of bees, unless you are a bee-keeper, **PLEASE** don't approach them, contact me on -

The first sign of a swarm is a huge 'cloud' of circling bees, and the sound can be quite alarming. However, they are less likely to sting you than one from a hive because they are full of honey and are just looking for a place to live.

After a few minutes they will alight on a branch, or chimney, or fence post etc, in a large clump, about the size of a football, and will stay there resting for about 20 minutes before moving off and repeating the process about 100 yards away.

Move away from them and try to keep calm. If you flap at them they may feel threatened.

On no account must you try to spray them with aerosol chemicals or water. Bees are a threatened species and without them humans will struggle to survive.

DELIVERING VILLAGE VOICES.

Whilst delivering *Village Voices* we called at a local farm which sells duck and chicken eggs. We met the lady of the house and enquired what had happened to the duck eggs as none were on display. She informed us, with a catch in her throat, that that a family of four ducks had been killed by a fox and she was devastated by the loss. However, she continued by saying that she still had 2 ducks, 2 goats, 2 horses and several chickens to look after.

BID TO REVITALISE GUYHIRN VILLAGE POND

The Guyhirn Pond Working Party is asking everyone from all villages who would like to see Guyhirn village pond restored to a more attractive looking feature. Wisbech St Mary Parish Council has assisted by having the dangerous trees removed, and the remainder pollarded.

Brenda Reay says, "The ideal thing to do with the pond is to terrace the banks to make it easier to maintain, and to drag and dispose of the excessive duckweed from the pond. Plant some more water based plants around the pond and to fill in part of one end so that a seating area can be designed with decorative plants.

At present the moorhens are hatching some chicks. We also have toads/newts etc in the pond, so the work we did last year seems to be paying off and attracting wildlife back. At present the water level is far too high to be able to work safely, but I am sure this will change in the next few weeks and a working area will be dry enough".

Anyone wishing to help to get the pond back to an attractive amenity please contact either Terry or Brenda on 450814. As a group, it will only take a few hours per week to clear the pond and surrounding area and the more help the Working Party can get the sooner it will look nicer.

FRUIT PILFERING AT WISBECH ST MARY

from the "Wisbech Advertiser", Wednesday September 5th 1883

At the Isle Magistrates' Court, Wisbech, James Knoll, labourer, was charged with wilfully and maliciously damaging a pear tree, by shaking the same, and taking twelve pears, value 3d, the property of Mr Henry Sharpe, at Wisbech St Mary, on the 26th August. The defendant pleaded not guilty.

Pc BUNNS stated: I know a field in Wisbech St Mary in the occupation of Mr Henry Sharpe, in which there are some pear trees. On the 26th August I saw Knoll picking up some pears that were lying on the ground. He then took hold of a branch of a tree and shook it, bringing some of the fruit to the ground. He picked up some of the pears and put them in his trousers pocket, and then went into Mr Marriott's field. I spoke to him and asked him what he was up to. He said he had picked up a few pears which had fallen over the dyke. I said the pears he shook off the tree had not fallen over the dyke. He admitted he had got about a dozen pears. The defendant said he would not give them to me.

The defendant said that although he told the officer he had about a dozen pears, he had none at all in his possession, as he had eaten all that he picked up. He denied that he shook the trees at all.

The Chairman of the Bench said the defendant could not expect the Bench to believe what he said after admitting that he told the officer an untruth.

The defendant persisted in saying that he did not shake the tree.

Mr James Long, (foreman to Mr Sharpe), informed the magistrates that these proceedings were taken entirely as a caution to others, as his employers had so many fruit trees about the district which they could not protect. What made the present case worse, too, was that the offence was committed on a Sunday.

Superintendent Anker said there had been so many complaints that he specially instructed the officer to watch the orchard.

The Bench ordered the defendant to pay a fine of 1s, for the damage to the tree 3d, and 13s 6d costs.

MOTOR CAR DAMAGE IN ST MARY'S

There have been several separate instances of criminal damage to motor vehicles occurring in Wisbech St Mary in recent weeks. These crimes were committed mainly in the Church Road and Churchfield Way areas, where the paintwork of the vehicles had been damaged by a sharp object. These are despicable acts of vandalism, and if anybody has any information to offer regarding these incidents they should contact the police. Similarly, if residents see anybody acting suspiciously in any of our villages they should call the police immediately. We all know that if we are travelling in a vehicle we should be wearing a seat belt, yet there are still some people that flout the law and do not wear a seat belt. For those that say they are only travelling a short distance, statistics show that you are more likely to have an accident whilst on a short journey than on a long journey. Children know that they should wear their seat belts etc, so there is no excuse for you adults. We have seen the adverts showing the consequences of being involved in a collision when not wearing a seat belt. Have you seen someone that has been involved in an accident and not worn their seat belt? Not always a pretty sight!! Remember CLUNK CLICK before every trip.

Drivers using a mobile phone whilst the vehicle is in motion are another group that think they can flout the law. Again we have seen the adverts and the tragic consequences of driving whilst using the mobile phone. No phone call is that important that it cannot wait until you can stop safely.

Since January 1st this year over 2000 tickets have been issued for seat belt and mobile phone offences. If you want to take the risk of driving whilst using the phone or not wearing a seat belt, I am very generous and carry plenty of tickets to give away.

Gorefield Adventure Patch. The long awaited official launch of the new Adventure Patch, which was postponed due to the weather on the 8th May, finally took place on a wonderful warm and sunny Saturday 22nd May. Hosted by the Parish Council the event was well supported by the invited guests, representatives of village organisations, parents, grandparents and most of all children of all ages. After a few words by the Council Chairman the ribbon was cut at 10.30 by Beth Morse, a pupil of Gorefield Primary school and the Patch was officially open. Everyone then enjoyed free entertainment, a bouncy castle, face painting and refreshments. The new equipment is part of funding secured to provide play opportunity for the 8 - 13 age range but the Council is continuing to source funding to bring new equipment to the Patch for toddlers, juniors and BMX users. A bid has also been made for funding to provide equipment for adult exercise.

Community Speed Watch. Speedwatch allows the public to get actively involved in monitoring the speed of vehicles travelling through their neighbourhood. It is used in areas where speeding has been identified as a priority at quarterly neighbourhood panel meetings. The scheme is run by Cambridgeshire Police alongside the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Road Safety Partnership. It is about educating motorists in the law in relation to speeding and monitoring any trends in speeding in neighbourhoods. Volunteers are trained to use speed indicator devices which displays vehicle speed. The registered owner of any vehicle seen exceeding the speed limit is sent an advisory letter from their local neighbourhood policing team, explaining that speeding is unacceptable to the local community. For more information on how to get involved, please contact the Parish Clerk for more details.

Parish Plan. The Parish Council first adopted the current Parish Plan in 2007. During that time there has good progress on certain elements of the action plan while others have proved more difficult and effectively stalled at this present time. To address this situation the Parish Council is working with Hetty Thornton from Fenland District Council to try to resolve the issues and kick-start some action. She will be working with Parish Councillor Alan Holt, and members of the Parish Plan Steering Group to identify areas of concern.
