The Acolytes' Guild

If you ever trouble to read the weekly pew sheet in church you may have noticed the occasional meeting of a mysterious society, *The Guild of Acolytes*. What is this strange organisation? Is it like something out of a Dan Brown novel: part of an international conspiracy to use the good offices of the Church of England to subvert and enslave the faithful to some nefarious end? Well...no.

The office of 'acolyte' is very ancient indeed (dating from the earliest churches in ancient Rome) and refers to persons who have been selected and trained to assist the priest and deacon at the altar during Holy Communion. Our Acolytes' Guild is a troop of youngsters who assist us at the altar on Sundays, by 'serving' and taking part in the gentle and ancient pageantry of our worship. Ten youngsters, varying in age between seven and sixteen, are learning the meticulous and sensitive business of laying up the altar, of liturgical processions, of presenting the bread and wine for consecration and accompanying priest and people as they approach the holy places in our church and our liturgy.

As part of that work we are learning many things together. We learn the scriptural and historical basis of the actions and words we use in church to frame the Sacraments. We learn about team work, about listening and observing, about stillness and movement, about receiving and giving blessings. But it's not all

study and 'Sunday best'. My colleague Lilian Brigden and I are also privileged to have some wonderful evening meetings with the youngsters where we use their inexhaustible imagination and irrepressible enthusiasm to look a little deeper at Bible stories and church history and even some quite complex issues of doctrine and tradition. When I tell you that our meetings over the last couple of years have involved treasure maps, radio controlled helicopters, a miniature steam engine, pancakes, and secret signs and ciphers, you may realise that we have fun as we learn.

I wish I could simply throw open the doors to any youngster to join us, but as is often the case in life, in order to gain membership you have, firstly, to make a real commitment to the life and work of the community you seek to join. Our youngsters earn their place in the Guild by coming to church regularly and taking part in the worship. They are not admitted until they are confident enough to understand and fulfil the responsibilities of servers and acolytes in the weekly services at church.

If you know a young person who would like to start coming to church, perhaps as a preparation for baptism or confirmation, or perhaps because they have started to ask probing questions about religion, spirituality or faith, do ring me or drop me a line; my details can be found under 'useful contacts'.

LENT: WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?

Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before Easter in the Christian calendar. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, It is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. By observing the 40 days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for 40 days. Lent is marked by fasting, both from food and festivities.

Lent is an old English word meaning 'lengthen'. Lent is observed in spring, when the days begin to get longer. Purple is the symbolic colour used in churches throughout Lent, for drapes and altar frontals. Purple is used for two reasons: firstly because it is associated with mourning and so anticipates the pain and suffering of the crucifixion, and secondly because purple is the colour associated with royalty, and celebrates Christ's resurrection and sovereignty.

SHROVE TUESDAY IS THE DAY BEFORE ASH WEDNESDAY.

It's a day of penitence, to clean the soul, and a day of celebration as the last chance to feast before Lent begins. Shrove Tuesday is sometimes called Pancake Day after the fried batter recipe traditionally eaten on this day.

But there's more to Shrove Tuesday than feasting on pancakes or taking part in a public pancake race. The pancakes themselves are part of an ancient custom with deeply religious roots: Penitence. Shrove Tuesday gets its name from the ritual of shriving that Christians used to undergo in the past. In shriving, a person confesses their sins and receives absolution for them. When a person receives absolution for their sins, they are forgiven for them and released from the guilt and pain that they have caused them. This tradition is very old. Over 1000 years ago a monk wrote in the Anglo-Saxon Ecclesiastical Institutes: "In the week immediately before Lent everyone shall go to his confessor and confess his deeds and the confessor shall so shrive him".

Shrove Tuesday is a day of celebration as well as penitence, because it's the last day before Lent, a time of abstinence, of giving things up. So Shrove Tuesday is the last chance to indulge yourself, and to use up the foods that aren't allowed in Lent.

During Lent there are many foods that some Christians - historically and today - would not eat: foods such as meat and fish, fats, eggs, and milky foods. So that no food was wasted, families would have a feast on the shriving Tuesday, and eat up all the foods that wouldn't last the forty days of Lent without going off. The need to eat up the fats gave rise to the French name Mardi Gras ('fat Tuesday'). Pancakes became associated with Shrove Tuesday as they were a dish that could use up all the eggs, fats and milk in the house with just the addition of flour.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday is a day of repentance and it marks the beginning of Lent. Ashes were used in ancient times, according to the Bible, to express mourning. Dusting oneself with ashes was the penitent's way of expressing sorrow for sins and faults. An ancient example of expressing one's penitence is found in the book of the prophet Jeremiah, calling for repentance: "O my people, gird on sackcloth, roll in the ashes" (Jer 6:26). The prophet Daniel pleaded for God this way: "I turned to the Lord God, pleading in earnest prayer, with fasting, sackcloth and ashes" (Daniel 9:3). Just prior to the New Testament period, the rebels fighting for Jewish independence, the Maccabees, prepared for battle using ashes: "That day they fasted and wore sackcloth; they sprinkled ashes on their heads and tore their clothes" (1 Maccabees 3:47).

Lent starts on Ash Wednesday, March 9th. This is the time of the year we remind everyone that the Christmas wreaths should be removed to make way for the Spring flowers for Mothering Sunday and Easter. If you are unable to clear them, I will remove them for you.

PRE-SCHOOL "GOOD IN ALL AREAS" As reported in the "Wisbech Stadard".

Gorefield Pre-school has been judged to be good in all areas after the first report by inspectors since moving into its new purpose-built premises.

During the inspection in December, an Ofsted inspector said the overall provision was good, with children's learning promoted through a knowledgeable and supportive staff team.

The pre-school moved from its 60-year-old premises into its new £100,000 building in the grounds of the primary school last July. There were 25 children aged two to five years on roll.

Inspector Sue Rogers said in her report: "Children's learning is well supported by a caring and committed staff team. Children are encouraged to be self-reliant, by having access to activities to promote their independence.

"They spread butter on their crackers, pour their own drinks at snack time and eagerly put on their own coats and boots before playing outdoors." The children learn about healthy eating and grow fruit and vegetables. They harvest the vegetables and make them into soup.

The well-resourced play areas provide exciting experiences for the children who use the purpose built dens to create imagined scenarios. Visits to the local library, church, shops and post office ensure the children learn about the community they live in.

Any other applications made thereafter would be given sympathetic consideration and generally any group social or otherwise in the village can apply in writing for a donation. The money is split thus because when the Gorefield Show first started nearly 50 years ago, it was organised purely to raise money for the church, thus forming a constitution.

POLICE WARNING!

It has been brought to our attention that there may be a bogus caller claiming to be from the Water Board in and around the Wisbech area. Distraction burglary is a despicable crime which can be carried out in a variety of ways and often on elderly and vulnerable victims. There are a number of precautions people can take to reduce the risk of becoming a victim. It is also important that people remain vigilant to activity in their neighbourhood, particularly in areas with vulnerable or elderly residents. Always remember:

LOCK - Is your back door locked? If not, lock it before you answer the front door as distraction burglars often work in pairs - one distracts, while the other steals

STOP - Are you expecting anybody?

CHAIN - Put this on before you open the door. If you have not got one, it is a worthwhile investment. It will give you that extra 'safe space' and barrier between you and the caller and then,

CHECK - Ask for their identification card, take it and look at it carefully. Close the door and check the number in the phone book - not the number on the card. If they are genuine they will not mind waiting or coming back another day. Bogus Callers may be smartly dressed, and claim to be from organisations such as the Council, Gas, and Water etc. They can also be very convincing and persuasive. They often use props such as an identity card, or may even wear overalls with a company logo. Anyone with information should contact Wisbech Police Station on 0345 456 456 4.

FORMER PAR SEEKS SPONSORSHIP FOR WOUNDED SERVICE PERSONNEL

Twenty-three years old James Tattingham, of Gorefield, will be taking part in the Reading Half Marathon on Sunday 20th March 2011 on behalf of BLESMA, the national charity for limbless serving and ex-service men and women and their dependents and widows.

It is the charity that directly supports all our service men and women who lose limbs, the use of limbs or eyes or the sight of an eye in the service of our country and are with them all whenever they are needed for the rest of their lives. Their work starts with rehabilitation - proving that there is life after amputation. Their work is about amputee helping amputee - the fellowship of shared experience. Their work is about life-long welfare support, about campaigning for what they deserve and about being there when old injuries come back to haunt. The youngest member is 19 and the eldest is 99 - truly they are BLESMA for life.

James writes, "I recently served in the Parachute Regiment for 4 years and served on an operational tour in Afghanistan I the summer of 2008. I have witnessed the effects of war and the way it affects peoples's lives. My fellow Paras are currently serving in Afghanistan as I write this, doing their part for our country while we sleep safe at night. The main reason for me taking part in this event is that I have witnessed amputees before my very eyes, but I have also seen full recovery. I have seen a friend have both his legs and arm blown off, and because of this charity I saw him two months later after the tour actually walking. This is all thanks to charities such as BLESMA that people can go on to lead perfectly normal lives. It is outstanding. I feel that is so important that we continue to support our troops. So, I feel I should do my part here in the UK and show how much I appreciate everything they're doing for us and the risks they are taking by giving something back to them.

"I do have sponsorship forms available, but most people have been sponsoring me online at <u>uk.virginmoneygiving.com/JamesTattingham</u>. Through Virgin Money Giving, you can sponsor me and donations will be quickly processed. Virgin Money Giving is a not foe profit organisation and will claim gift aid on a charity's behalf where the donor is eligible for this."
