Remembrance

Ryk Parkinson, Associate Priest.

On the 11th November at 11am many people will stop, stand in silence and remember those killed in the 2 World Wars and subsequent conflicts. On Sunday 13th thousands will gather around war memorials in town and village in an act of remembrance. A service of remembrance will be held in each of our villages – we will remember them.

Those of us who have served in the forces will carry our own memories. When I visited the Armed Forces Memorial in Staffordshire I found the names of 6 colleagues engraved on its walls, colleagues that had died on military operations or in terrorist attack. It was a moving experience, especially as I also visited the Cambridgeshire Regiment memorial for the Far East prisoners. However, public remembrance had started to fade until the reports of casualties in Iraq and Afghanistan rekindled public awareness of the cost of conflict in human lives both those killed and the greater number of those wounded. The growth of attendance at the Wootton Bassett (now Royal Wootton Bassett) repatriations was a prominent sign of the peoples' wish to show respect for those who paid the ultimate price. Freedom parades and medal ceremonies are more common and feature prominently in TV and press reports, and the care and rehabilitation of the wounded is now given a high priority, as is the care of bereaved relatives. It is not only right that we should care for those who are prepared to face danger to protect us, it is our Christian duty to care for those who suffer, physically and mentally, however such suffering may occur.

Let us also remember the Christian belief that God so loved us that his son, Jesus Christ, died for each one of us that we might be saved for the suffering of sin and given a new life. Christ too, laid down his life for others.

So, please join us at your local Remembrance Service, at church or memorial, on Sunday the 13th as we honour those military and civilian people who were prepared to sacrifice their lives to give us the freedom we enjoy today.

'Vicar's Verbals'

Ministers spend a lot of time going into hospitals – perhaps not as much as we would like – as visits to parishioners tend to be rather brief affairs within the limitations of the working day. It is only as a patient, or the loved one of a patient, that we find ourselves waiting in corridors, wards and coffee bars, whiling away the anxious hours before our beloved appears swathed in bandages, pale but smiling, to be wheeled up to their ward. Waiting for my dear wife to come back from knee surgery I watched the ebb and flow of people; a whole population of individuals in overalls, scrubs, uniforms and smart suits, scuttling purposefully upon their interrelated, mysterious missions like termites in a giant humming mound. I was struck by just how many people it took to keep the organisation running smoothly. Each worker with a particular task - some glamorous and highly technical - others repetitive and humble - but each beautiful creature adapted perfectly to its task - and each one utterly essential to all of the others. No supplier of latex gloves, no water trolley pilot, no anaesthetist, no record keeper, no bed pusher, no electrician, no orthopaedic surgeon, no nursing assistant....and the complex business of healing just one patient would founder. A visiting American friend, a doctor, once said to me that the National Health Service is the jewel in Britain's crown and that we should do everything in our power to protect and nurture it. Amen to that. Matthew.

HEDGEHOGS NEED GARDENERS' SUPPORT

A recent report, entitled *The State of Britain's Hedgehogs*, shows that hedgehog numbers have dropped by 25% in just ten years! In response the British Hedgehog Preservation Trust (BHPT), along with the People's Trust for Endangered Species has launched a three-year campaign, which will draw together data from surveys over the last decade about the status of hedgehog populations in the UK.

IMPORTANT NEW DEVELOPMENT AT PARSON DROVE SURGERY

A patients' participation group has recently been formed at the Parson Drove Surgery. It will be known as the Parson Drove Patients' Group and its members represent the Practice's wide catchment area around the Cambridgeshire and Lincolnshire border.

Dr Andrew Chandler, senior partner at the Practice, said "Parson Drove Surgery GP partners welcome the newly formed Parson Drove Patient Group.

"The NHS is undergoing major reorganisation which will mean changes for the practice and patients alike. It is vitally important that good communications are developed and maintained between patients and the practice, so that there is full understanding of the National and Local changes that we face and that we can work together to develop the practice and improve patient care.

The purpose of the Patient Group is to act as a reference group to support and advise the practice as it develops.

The Group members are not available to the patients of the practice to manage any individual complaints, but are there for you to talk to about any issues you would like raised to help improve the services offered by the Practice. They would also like to hear of any positive feedback about the practice".

Patients' Group Questionnaire

The newly-formed Patients' Group at Parson Drove Surgery has produced a questionnaire which gives registered patients the opportunity to comment on their experience when using the surgery. The feedback will assist the new Group in identifying areas where the practice can look to improve the service for patients. The questionnaires are now available from the surgery, the pharmacy, shops, post offices and other outlets, and should be returned to the surgery no later than Friday November 11th. Patients' names are not required, and answers will be kept in the strictest confidence.

CHECK YOUR HOME SECURITY.

Information from Cambridgeshire Constabulary

This summer has seen a sharp increase in the number of dwelling burglaries across the Wisbech sector. The majority of these offences have occurred during the daytime or evening period and most have been committed at properties where the occupants were away or on holiday. The main items of interest to thieves for this type of crime are jewellery and large electrical items. Some simple tips to prevent against this type of offence: -

- Use timer switches to operate household electrical goods whilst you are away. Lights, radios and even television sets can all be timed to come on when you are not home.
- Do not leave curtains or blinds open when you are not home. This makes it far too easy for potential thieves to spot items of interest –
- Under no circumstances leave any windows open, even if only on the latch. This includes upstairs windows and skylights. Ensure all doors are locked and bolted where possible.
- Use a trusted friend or relative to house-sit whilst you are away. Ask somebody trusted to attend your address occasionally to remove the build up of mail, which is a tell tale sign of a vacant home.
- Do not advertise the fact that you are going to be away.
- Ensure that any existing home security measures such as burglar alarms and motion sensor lighting are fully operational.
- Report any suspicious activity at properties you know to be empty immediately to Police. You will never be criticised for calling in, even if it turns out to be completely innocent.
